Teaching online safety in school (DfE publication, June 2019)

Guidance supporting schools to teach their pupils how to stay safe online, within new and existing school subjects

This guidance from the Department for Education outlines how schools can ensure pupils understand how to stay safe and behave online as part of existing and forthcoming curriculum requirements.

From September 2020 Relationships Education will be compulsory for all primary aged pupils, Relationships and Sex Education will be compulsory for all secondary aged pupils and Health Education will be compulsory in all state-funded schools in England. Through these new subjects pupils will be taught about online safety and harms. This will include being taught what positive, healthy and respectful online relationships look like, the effects of their online actions on others and knowing how to recognise and display respectful behaviour online.

The guidance states;

'We want schools to equip their pupils with the knowledge needed to make the best use of the internet and technology in a safe, considered and respectful way, so they are able to reap the benefits of the online world.'

The advice in the guidance brings together information that will help schools deliver online safety content within their curriculum and embed this within a wider whole school approach.

How safe are our children online?

A new report from the NSPCC

This report brings together the most up to date statistics on online abuse that exist in the UK. Based on the data currently available, the NSPCC has compiled different indicators in an effort to understand the extent, nature and response to online harm. The key messages from the report will help schools understand the risks that exist online, essential knowledge when planning 'Internet Safety and Harms' teaching which will form part of the statutory health curriculum from September 2020.

Some headline survey responses include:

- 31 per cent of children aged 12 to 15 reported seeing worrying or nasty online content
- 21 per cent of surveyed girls aged 11 to 18 said they had received a request for a sexual image or message
- 4 per cent of surveyed primary school-aged children and 5 per cent of surveyed secondary-school aged children said they had been sent or shown a naked or semi-naked picture or video from an adult

The DfE statutory Health Education guidance (implemented from September 2020) states that by the end of the primary school, pupils should know:

'that the internet can ... be a negative place where online abuse, trolling, bullying and harassment can take place, which can have a negative impact on mental health.'

By the end of the secondary school pupils should know:

'how to identify harmful behaviours online (including bullying, abuse or harassment) and how to report, or find support, if they have been affected by those behaviours.'
